1A.

Positive Parenting Program: Participants of this workshop will learn about the “nuts and bolts” of Triple P interventions and practitioner training. The presentation will include a brief introduction to the public health approach to parenting, an overview of the Triple P System, considerations for implementation, and a snapshot of the training. PATHS: This workshop will give participants an overview of the social emotional curriculum, Promoting Alternative Thinking Strategies (PATHS). This curriculum is taught in elementary school classrooms by teachers and helps students develop social, emotional, interpersonal relationships, and problem-solving skills. Raising Healthy Children: This workshop will provide an overview of the Raising Healthy Children program, developed by the Social Development Research Group at the University of Washington, the creators of the Communities that Care model. The

evidence-based program is a social development approach to positive youth development that incorporates school, family and individual programs to promote key elements that research has shown are critical for creating strong connections and bonds that children need to succeed in school and life: opportunities, skills and recognition. The workshop will highlight the successful 4-year implementation of the universal prevention program in all Bedford County elementary schools that has been featured on the US Department of Education “Doing What Works” initiative. Districts throughout the county saw dramatic drops in discipline referrals, strong increases in academic achievement, significant increases in parent involvement, more effective and efficient teaching strategies and improvements in school-wide learning environments. *Presented by:*

2A.

Communicating Outcomes: Since 1989, the Commonwealth has administered the PA Youth Survey (PAYS) every two years to school students in grade 6, 8, 10 and 12 to learn more about their behavior, attitudes and knowledge concerning alcohol, tobacco, other drugs and violence. The data gathered in PAYS serve two primary needs: 1.) the results provide school administrators, state agency directors, legislators and others with critical information concerning the changes in patterns of the use and abuse of these harmful substances and behaviors, and 2.) the survey assesses risk factors that are related to these behaviors and the protective factors that help guard against them. This information allows community leaders to direct prevention resources to areas where they are likely to have the greatest impact. This workshop will introduce participants to the PAYS (survey design, administration) and provide specific strategies for how they can use the data as a tool to select community prevention priorities and choose appropriate programs and strategies to address risky youth behaviors at the local level. *Presented by: Stephanie Bradley, Evaluation Specialist, EPISCenter; Geoff Kolchin, Analyst, Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency*

Legislative and Media Advocacy — Working Together for Better

Results: This workshop will demonstrate skills that are necessary in helping participants' representatives understand the impact of local coalition work, how it relates to the return on investment of tax dollars and how to use it to advocate for future prevention funding. *Presented by: Clay Yeager, President, The Yeager Group*

Community Capacity Building and Volunteerism: This session will explore how community involvement plays a key role in community-level outcomes and collaboration. There will be an emphasis on the business sector and how they can be a prevention partner. Youth involvement will also be discussed at length including how to involve students in the prevention planning process by using the Pennsylvania Youth Survey and the 40 Developmental Assets model (along with the Communities That Care model) to reduce adolescent problem behaviors such as teen pregnancy, substance abuse, truancy, violence, depression and delinquency. Using Fit & Feasibility When Making Program Selection: As prevention funding opportunities continue to decline, communities are forced to make highly-informed decisions when determining prevention programming. Before determining the need of new or additional services, today's most resourceful communities have taken strides to effectively assess current prevention programming by evaluating the fit and feasibility of existing programs as related to their potential of achieving population-level change. 3A.

Communities That Care (CTC) 201: A finely tuned coalition is the foundation for community success and for future funding. This workshop is designed for those who are currently implementing the CTC process or who have attended the CTC 101 workshop in the past. Participants will learn how to take their efforts to the next level by using some simple evaluation tools and nurturing the most critical parts of their coalition.

3B.

Planned Enhancements to PBPS: Pennsylvania BDAP has applied for and received a Strategic Prevention Enhancement (SPE) grant from the Center of Substance Abuse Prevention (CSAP). Part of this grant will go towards enhancing the PBPS (Performance-Based Prevention Service) that is hosted and maintained by KIT Solutions, LLC.

The following briefly describe the enhancements planned for PBPS:

1. Addition of a Real-Time Data Visualization (RTDV) dashboard as a stand-alone module that will allow existing data elements in PBPS and other external data be overlaid and presented in map, chart or table form;
2. Creation of a mobile web browser page for PBPS;
3. Creation of county epidemiological profiles based on data in PBPS;
4. Creation of a Intervention Client Management Service (ICMS); and
5. Development of a variety of video-based online trainings for the prevention workforce.

Criminal Street Gang Identification and Awareness: National gangs are within Pennsylvania. This workshop will assist individuals in being able to identify colors, symbols, and logos that are affiliated with national gangs in Pennsylvania. They will learn the gang subculture and how it influences individuals. They will also learn how the gang subculture may impact them working with gang members on an individual as well as a group basis.

Unintentional Poisonings by Prescription Drugs: A 2006 CDC report showed that the rise in drug overdose mortality is due to increasing deaths from prescription drugs rather than from illicit drugs such as heroin and cocaine. The primary problem is opioid analgesics. Physicians increasingly prescribed this class of drugs during the 1990s to treat moderate and severe pain. This workshop will include an overview of the public health burden of unintentional poisonings by prescription drugs in Pennsylvania, potential strategies to prevent these deaths, and how healthcare providers are key partners in the safe prescribing of opioid analgesics. *Presented by: Mary Jo Cerepani, DNP, CRNP, PA Department of Health Injury Community Planning Group*

3E.

A Journey into the Dark World of College Student Life: Lessons I've Learned about Alcohol and Drug Use as a Professor Working the "Night Shift" as a Volunteer EMT: This workshop explores Ann Major's journey as a 25-year veteran college professor who became an Emergency Medical Technician in January 2010 and began volunteering on the night shift as an EMT. Major has worked on an ambulance for over 1500 hours taking care of patients who have overdosed on alcohol and/or drugs. Her initial research exploring the risk perceptions of college students' alcohol use began in 2003. In 2009, she took an EMT class and then trained as a paramedic to gain a clearer understanding of risk-taking behaviors in patients. She has worked with patients whose hearts have stopped as a result of alcohol and drug overdoses as well as patients who have undergone horrific life-changing injuries because of overdoses. Her experiences have changed how she works with college students in the classroom. In this workshop, she will share her experiences in the field as well as her research findings about why students and adults continue to engage in risky behaviors despite knowing the potential consequences of those behaviors.

4A.

Integration of Coalition Models: There are a number of popular models for developing a community prevention coalition. Although the models are often viewed as competing, in reality they have many more similarities than differences. Though funding streams often dictate a certain way of "doing business", we are left to contemplate what really works best for our communities and whether it's possible to pursue funding without significantly changing course. This workshop will offer participants the opportunity to view popular practices from different initiatives such as Drug Free Communities, Strategic Prevention Framework, 40 Developmental Assets, and Communities That Care. Participants will assess the similarities and differences that drive funding and initiatives and help them understand that it is possible to "mix and match" in coalition work. *Presented by: Sandy Hinkle and Phyllis Law, Communities That Care Consultants, EPISCenter, Penn State University*

Dependence and the Elderly: This workshop will consider the risks of substance abuse and dependence for senior citizens. Youth Behaviors: Alcohol, Tobacco, Other Drugs and Gambling (ATOD+G): This workshop will compare and differentiate between youth addictive behaviors and gambling. Prevention in the Recovery-Oriented System of Care (ROSC):

Recovery Oriented Systems of Care requires an extensive network, including PREVENTION, treatment, intervention, recovery supports and services. This network is inclusive of and coordinates with multiple service systems in providing responsive outcomes-driven approaches to care. As this system changes and grows it is important to have prevention available and prepared to use our proven best practices to: prevent the further development of new substance use disorders, reduce the harm caused by addiction and assist and help individuals and families and communities transition from brief experiments in recovery initiation to more sustained recovery maintenance. *Presented by: Tim Phillips, CAC, Program Director, Prevention Services of Westmoreland County at Westmoreland Community Action; Kathy Jo Stence, Program Analyst, Bureau of Drug & Alcohol Programs*

Promoting Healthy Relationships—Sexual Assault, Dating Violence, and Substance Use Prevention:

Also discussed will be the link between sexual violence and substance use and abuse, which often go under recognized. Topics will include the Public Health Approach to violence prevention efforts currently underway in Pennsylvania and activities for collaborating with community sexual violence crisis centers. 5A.

Prevention + Education = A+ Future For Our Children: In this workshop participants will explore the reasons to provide prevention education in the classroom, community and home settings. Participants will work in small groups to recall their experiences working in these settings to identify the positives and challenges. Participants will discuss and plan for best practices working with schools and teachers when scheduling and delivering programming with fidelity and collecting necessary data. Participants will share current strategies and practice new ways of successfully implementing reoccurring programs to the elementary child. Programs can be implemented with fidelity while still allowing room for enhancements that best fit the nature of the individual classroom and student's learning styles. Participants will place themselves in the role of a classroom or Community Prevention Specialist and exam case studies of different situations and will then role play possible outcomes. Participants will work together and learn from other's best (and worst) moments to identify possible successful strategies for future interactions. Together we will spend our time in this workshop discovering the best way to add Prevention + Education to = an A+ Future For Our Children. *Presented by: Anna Messina, First Grade Teacher, Blessed John Paul II Elementary School*

5B.

Addiction—A Family Matter: A limited understanding of addiction can lead to confusion and anger among family members impacted by a loved ones dependence. Further, the myths and misunderstanding about the causes and treatments for addiction tend to negatively impact recovery. This workshop will consider how a family is affected by addiction to substances as well as other process addictions like gambling and shopping. It will offer basic information to help clarify and understand the problem and offer suggestions that minimize shame and offer helpful ways to lovingly help the addicted family member. 5C.

Alcohol and the Adolescent Brain: This presentation will focus on recent findings regarding adolescent alcohol use, adolescent brain development, and the impact of alcohol on adolescent behavior and brain function. By the end of this workshop the participant will be able to: 1.) Describe characteristics of the adolescent stage of growth and development; 2.) Identify areas of the brain still developing during adolescence; and 3.) Describe the effects of alcohol consumption during adolescence on the developing brain.

Exploring Current Drug Trends: Exploring Current Drug Trends will investigate contemporary recreational street drugs and patterns of substance abuse. This program will explore the three substances recently banned in Pennsylvania (bath salts, synthetic cannabis, Salvia divinorum), reasons for rampant prescription drug abuse, incidence of methamphetamine abuse and other cultural trends such as "Purple stuff," Melatonin Brownies, alcohol energy drinks and high energy drinks. Program will utilize Power Point presentation, data sheets, case studies, and will encourage discussion and group interaction.

Ethics: This workshop encompasses the many complex elements that determine the "right action" for substance abuse professionals.
